





Texas added 367,215 people between July 1, 2018 and July 1, 2019.


- About 1,006 people per day added to our population between 2018 and 2019
 - About 483 persons per day from natural increase (more births than deaths)
 - About 523 per day from net migration (178 international and 345 domestic migrants per day).




Estimates of Percent Components of Population Change, Texas, 2011-2019



Linear Forecast of Census Bureau Population Estimates 2010-2019 and TDC Population Projections




Total Estimated Population by County, Texas, 2018





CENSUS 2020

- Census counts used for:
 - reapportion the U.S. House of Representatives
 - electoral college votes
 - redraw congressional and state legislative boundaries



- distribution of more than \$675 billion in federal funds for:
 roads, schools, hospitals, public works, and other vital programs.
- 1% undercount of Texans could translate to a loss of \$300 million per year.

Census 2020 Timeline

March 12 - 20: Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.


March 30 - April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing homelessness and living in shelters.

April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. By this date, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census.

•April: Census takers will begin visiting group quarters.

•May - July: Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded.

•December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.







Hard to Count Census Tracts




About 25% of Texas's current population (or 6,908,991 people) live in hard-tocount neighborhoods

Predicted Mail Non-Response Rate (%)


Low Response Score by 2017 Census Tract (2019 Planning Database)



Predicted Mail Non-Response for 2020 Census














Census 2020 Complete Count Committees in Texas




"To stimulate public cooperation necessary for an accurate census...Congress has provided assurances that information furnished by individuals is to be treated as confidential. Title 13 U.S.C. §§8(b) and 9(a) explicitly provide for nondisclosure of certain census data, and no discretion is provided to the Census Bureau on whether or not to disclose such data..." (U.S. Supreme Court, Baldrige v. Shapiro, 1982)

Reconstruction - The recreation of individual-level data from tabular or aggregate data.

If you release enough tables or statistics, eventually there will be a unique solution for what the underlying individual-level data were.

Computer algorithms on fast computers can do this easily



Differential Privacy

- Differential Privacy involves injecting noise into the Census data with formal privacy rules that results in reconstruction being less accurate as more noise is introduced
- Differential privacy, will result in a significant trade-off in data accuracy, potentially making the public data less useful for many scientific, program administration, and policy applications.
